

# Effects of Land Acquisition and Resettlement & Rehabilitation Policy

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**Abstract** - The acquisition of land for development initiatives has been a vital catalyst for economic advancement in India; however, it has also resulted in significant displacement and socio-economic upheaval. The enactment of the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013 represented a notable transition towards a more compassionate and transparent methodology for land acquisition and rehabilitation. This research investigates the efficacy of the Rehabilitation and Resettlement provisions outlined in the Act, concentrating on their effects on the communities impacted. Utilizing a case study methodology, the study assesses compensation strategies, restoration of livelihoods, social integration, and the institutional hurdles faced during implementation. The results suggest that although the policy framework is progressive and centered on rights, there are still deficiencies in execution, especially regarding timely compensation, involvement of stakeholders, and sustainable rehabilitation results. The paper concludes with recommendations for policy enhancements to fortify implementation and promote inclusive development.

## 1. INTRODUCTION

Land acquisition has historically been a controversial topic in India, as it seeks to balance the necessity for infrastructure development with the rights and livelihoods of those affected. The Land Acquisition Act of 1894 allowed the state to acquire land with minimal protections for displaced communities, frequently leading to insufficient compensation and inadequate rehabilitation results.

In response to these issues, the Government of India implemented the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act in 2013, which brought about significant reforms such as improved compensation, obligatory social impact assessments, and thorough rehabilitation and resettlement measures.

The principle of Rehabilitation and Resettlement (R&R) is crucial in ensuring that displaced individuals receive not only compensation for their lost assets but also the means to restore their livelihoods and enhance their quality of life. Consequently, effective R&R policies are vital for fostering sustainable and inclusive development.

This research intends to critically evaluate the effects of land acquisition and R&R policies in India, concentrating on their implementation and results through a case study approach.

- Case analysis

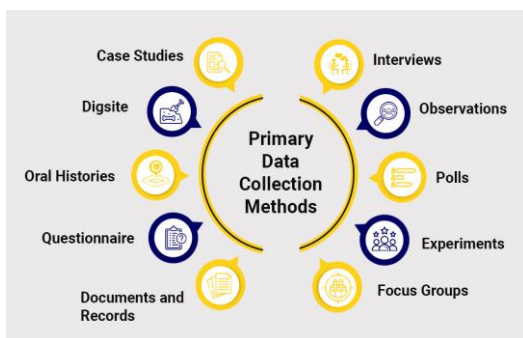


Fig -1: primary data collection
